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


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VAREEN AZAD Account Manager of a German Medical Disposal Company

1. HydroKurd

HydroKurd is a portable device designed by Kurdish engineers at ZDR in Kurdistan to introduce molecular hydrogen therapy into the body. The therapy is intended to balance the effects of modern-day diet and pollution, acting as an antioxidant, anti-inflammatory, antiapoptotic, and antiallergic agent. Hydrogen therapy can be administered through various methods, with inhalation being the easiest and simplest.

The HydroKurd device separates O2 and H2 gases from distilled water and outputs them for therapy through inhalation or mixing with drinking water. It has undergone 18 stages of modification over seven years and is made up of high-end hardware with high safety standards. Two models of HydroKurd devices are available: the HK1000 and HK3500, capable of producing up to 1000cc/minute and 3500cc/minute of H2 gas, respectively.

During development, HydroKurd was tested on a range of patients in Kurdistan, demonstrating positive results in line with other studies globally. HydroKurd is now available for large-scale production and distribution and has the potential to become the first Kurdish-made advanced medical device to compete in the global market.

Hydrogen therapy is an emerging field of research and has been shown to offer various health benefits. Inhalation of hydrogen gas, in particular, has been studied for its potential effectiveness in COVID-19 cases. As a portable and versatile device, Hydro-Kurd has the potential to provide accessible hydrogen therapy to people in hospitals, clinics, homes, and specialized centers.



2. EcoKurd

Developed by ZDR, a technology and engineering firm based in Sulaymaniyah, Iraq, EcoKurd improves fuel efficiency and reduces emissions for all engine types. It achieves an optimal air-fuel ratio and can increase engine power, reduce maintenance frequency, and extend engine and oil life. The device uses a gas catalyst to increase fuel burning speed, runs autonomously with safety features, and notifies users of malfunctions via LED indicators. Installation is quick and easy, and the device has a range of approximately 15,000 kilometers before needing a \$30 annual refill. The current version is the 19th prototype, optimized for size, effectiveness, and practicality with LED malfunction displays, internal fuel backup, copy protection, and a smart system that adapts to all conditions.

NABAZ NAWZAD

I was in the first group of students admitted to UKH in 2006, and at that time we had foundation before starting University. There was a robust filtering process to get into UKH, but I was



one of the luckiest students and was accepted as a pre-foundation student. Then, I started studying a bachelor's degree in Politics and International Relations; in addition to studying modules directly related to my major, we also had to study modules related to Business Management, Information Technology, and Sociology which helped us to enrich our skills and gain different competencies.

At UKH, we had to write, search, communicate, and work in a team; thus, I spent most of my time in the library.

UKH became my motion to start my master's degree in Public Management at the Northern University of Malaysia (UUM). I remember, I did not have IELTS at that time, which was required to study at master's level, so I went to the Entrance Test, and I passed the exam with flying colors. Even though the field was different, the program and the teaching methods applied at UKH made it very easy for me to be one of the top students in the university; thus, the university offered a scholarship to cover my doctorate study, and I was able to complete my Ph.D. in Public Management. After completing my journey in Malaysia, I returned to Kurdistan and started my career as a lecturer at the Lebanese French University. Within a month, I was promoted to Department Coordinator and Head of the Business Administration Department.

In 2018, I was selected to go to Finland and take the Teachers Professional Development Program (Pedagogy) in Finland at the Häme University of Applied Sciences. Since 2019, I have trained hundreds of university instructors and lecturers on modern teaching and entrepreneurial learning. I have taught in more than 14 universities in Kurdistan and delivered many training programs on a wide range of topics to organizations and the public as well as participating in several training and development programs abroad. Since February 2021, I have been the Dean of the Administration and Economic College at the Lebanese French University. In addition, I am currently an adjunct lecturer and visiting supervisor at UKH. Overall, I believe UKH is at the heart of my achievements; I have always been proud to be a UKHian, and it was the best thing that happened to me. UKH for me was not only the university but a value, community, culture, and the future.

AHMED BAYIZ

Programme Director of Business, Management, and Economics-UKH

When UKH opened its doors in 2006, I was among the first group of students to join the newly established institution. I graduated in 2010 with 1st class honors.

In 2011, I was awarded a full scholarship by the KRG and moved to Australia to pursue my master's degree, first, at the University of South Australia and then at the University of Canberra, where I obtained my degree with distinction.

In 2014, I was awarded a Chinese Government scholarship to study another master's degree at Tsinghua University and a PhD at Beijing University . In 2019, I started my Post-Doctoral Fellowship at the prestigious Shanghai Jiao Tong University where I published 17 papers in prestigious academic journals and completed the fellowship with distinction.

I am an exceptionally prolific research scholar and have published over 20 scholarly articles in high impact journals in collaboration with several eminent scholars from China, Australia, Germany, the UK and the UAE. In 2018, the Ministry of Higher Education and Scientific Research recognized me as the Top Social Science Researcher of the Year-2018.

In 2021 and 2022, I was invited to be a Visiting Professor at the University College London's School of Public Policy in the UK and Aalen University of Applied Sciences in Germany. I returned to UKH as a full time faculty member in September 2021, and in January 2022, I was appointed as Acting Chair of Business and Management Department, and now I am the Programme Director of Business, Management and Economics.

I credit all I have now to UKH for one simple reason. UKH helped me to become who I am today. Before joining UKH as a student back in 2006, I came from a public school, having studied all my life in the Kurdish language with limited access to educational materials.

Soon after joining UKH, I took advantage of the resources available to UKH students. I had rarely used a computer

before 2006, so I started to learn how to use a computer in the labs. I was a frequent visitor to the library and I could easily remember the Business and Management related textbooks.
