Despite a hectic full-time job as a political officer at the British Consulate in Erbil with having around 40 hours per week where at times I found myself too overwhelmed with assignments to focus on anything but academic, I found the space. I re-furnished a room in my apartment to accommodate/force myself to stay put for 16-20 hours per weekend. With the gradual deep-seated academic anxiety, I had the sweetest and most intelligent supervisor whose guidance made the process clearer, Dr. Mohammed Bapir.

I also didn't jeopardize my health and resisted back with catching the gym at 06:30 every morning to support my mental health.

Being active in my career and academic life have taught me a lot. Women and Politics unfortunately don't match much in our societies, but we are here to change that! So far, I am the only female graduate at UKH holding a PhD, which could motivate many others to take this path if they want to.

I never believed in 'impossible'. Out of four PhD candidates of my year's cohort (three very respectful, smart, and encouraging male colleagues and myself), only I graduated in 2023. Resistance and dedication are key to flipping dreams. Neither success nor failure are final destinations, the courage to face them and the continuity are what matters.

It feels like the end now, but it is just the beginning of an exciting new chapter.

I am Halo Mohammed Hamakarim, and my professional journey began at the University of Kurdistan Hewler (UKH) as part of the class of 2016. Graduating from the Faculty of Natural Resources with a degree in petroleum engineering, I envisioned a future in the oil and gas industry, but my path took an unexpected turn. However, rather than being disheartened, I chose to embrace the opportunities at hand and felt like it is a national obligation for all to fight terrorism and participate in the national and governmental attempts for supporting and creating a safe space for the displaced influxes. The humanitarian response sector presented itself as a path forward in this regard, despite the stark contrast to my educational background. With dedication and a commitment to learning, I excelled in this field. Since graduation, I have had the privilege of working with multiple national and international non-governmental humanitarian organizations. Through hard work, I acquired managerial positions within these organizations, contributing significantly to various humanitarian field focuses such as emergency response, education, livelihood, protection, shelter, and development. I had the privilege to support



the newly displaced influxes during the liberation of Mosul and played a vital role in the development of local systems through all the program interventions carried out by our teams. What's crucial to highlight is that your educational background and professional life do not need to be perfectly matched for success. Success comes from taking initiatives and the hard work of consistently developing and updating the skills required for the job market. My journey from UKH to a successful career in humanitarian response is a testament to the power of adaptability, continuous learning, and the impact of a quality education. It's a reminder that success can be achieved in diverse fields when one is dedicated and willing to evolve. I encourage current and future students to embrace opportunities and never shy away from challenges, as it's often in adversity that our true potential is realized.


