My life took a transformative turn when I decided to depart from my conventional university in the Kurdistan region of Iraq and enroll at the University of Kurdistan Hawler (UKH) to pursue studies in English. As time unfolded, I discovered the profound impact this decision had on my entire life journey. I successfully completed my BSc with honors and continued my academic pursuit with an EMBA and MA in oil and gas management, earning academic excellence awards along the way.

During my time at the English language medium university, I realized the possibility of balancing work and study. Volunteering to assist Syrian refugees and internally displaced persons (IDPs) from 2013 to 2015 became a pivotal experience, leading to my initial employment in various international organizations such as DRC, ACTED, INTERSOS, and NRC, where I served as a WASH engineer and distribution and education officer. Subsequently, I transitioned to Rudaw Media Network, holding positions as the assistant to the planning department and a journalist. Currently, I serve as a research fellow at Rudaw Research Center, focusing on analytical writing, research, reports, translation, and book contributions in the fields of energy, economy, and the environment.

In the summer of 2022 in London, I achieved two certificates at LSE:

one for public policy analysis and environmental economics and another for sustainable development. These experiences have deepened my understanding of critical issues and improved my analytical skills, contributing to my vision of a more prosperous world.

I hold esteemed positions as the UNITE2030 ambassador in Iraq and the UN1FY National Focal Point for Iraq and the Kurdistan Region, representing two prominent global youth organizations dedicated to advancing the UN's 17 Sustainable Development Goals. In September 2022, in New York, I was selected as one of the 200 participants from a pool of 3000 applicants. Working in a team of 40, we developed a solution for SDG8 economic growth and decent work, winning the Sub Solution Hub for our proposal addressing the challenges faced by the BIOPAC community in Canada, excluded by a hiring algorithm.

Recently, I received acceptance to represent Iraq and the Kurdistan Region as a delegate at the Middle East Youth Summit 2024. Following my participation in different local and international forums, conferences, and most recently, the Doha Forum 2023, I express my deep appreciation and gratitude to UKH for the unwavering support provided, despite any other concerns I may have encountered.

UKH & BTU COLLABORATION AGREEMENT ON ACADEMIC, RESEARCH EXCHANGE

A UKH delegation, consisting of Prof. Keith Sharp, UKH President; Dr. Bayar Mustafa Sêvdeen, Dean of Research and External Engagement; and Mahnaz Lashkri, Strategic Projects and Partnerships Manager, met with Brandenburg University of Technology (BTU) President, Prof. Dr. Gesine Grande; Prof. Dr. Eike Albrecht, Chair of Public Law; and Steven Kramm, Academic Employee in the Chair of Environment, to discuss and sign the agreement.

The partnership primarily focuses on the topics of climate change, environmental studies, and entrepreneurship. It establishes the framework for a sustainable collaborative plan between both sides.

This agreement results from shared goals and a vision for contributing to global issues, particularly addressing different fields and challenges related to climate change, water resources management, and nature-based solutions. It is another steppingstone to promote a worldwide perspective on education and research and to further internationalize their outreach efforts.

The agreement presents an opportunity for UKH to create and enhance new programs and to work towards promoting a shared transfer of knowledge and skills. This includes the development of dual PhD and other postgraduate programs.

Both institutions plan to encourage learning by initiating visiting professor programs, allowing scholars to exchange ideas and knowledge.

Both sides also agreed to host PhD students to enhance the research experience and promote cultural exchange.

UKH sees BTU as a long-term partner and a gateway to the EU. This agreement marks a significant advance in the collaboration between UKH and BTU in the field of science. Both schools are eager to initiate new projects and anticipate positive results from our partnership, which is set to enhance the academic settings of both universities.

Pipeline Company (KPC), where I served as a senior engineer in the operations department. Following a rewarding experience, I embraced the role of Country Manager for

the Kurdistan branch of PSE Engineering GmbH, a German engineering company. Currently, I work for Clariant company in Dubai in the dynamic role of Cluster Manager of Qatar, Bahrain, Iraq, Turkey, and Kuwait. It has been a very exciting career path, but every experience is accompanied by its own challenges. Being the only woman is one of the biggest challenges in an industry dominated by more than 90% men worldwide, that despite the challenges, the oil and gas industry faces every day in terms of political and technical difficulties.
