NEW STUDY ABROAD ANNOUNCEMENT WITH HUDDERSFIELD UNIVERSITY

UKH has signed a progression agreement with the University of Huddersfield, located in the UK.

The partnership will enable our students to study at the University of Huddersfield, advancing their education and earning dual degrees at the end of their studies.

We were delighted to receive a delegation today to discuss the implementation of this partnership and opportunities that will be available for our students.

We held an information session for students progressing to the University in the next academic year.

The University of Huddersfield has been rated Gold in all three aspects of the Teaching Excellence Framework (TEF) 2023 according to UK education standards. It was the only university in Yorkshire and the Humber and the Northwest to achieve gold ratings in all three aspects of the TEF among those announced in September 2023. Their academic staff rank in the top three in England for the proportion who hold doctorates, who have higher degrees, and hold teaching qualifications (HESA 2022).



As a UKH alumnus, I am eager to share my story and career path. I achieved a Bachelor of Arts (Hons) in Politics and International Studies in September 2016. Afterward, I went abroad and successfully completed my studies, earning a Master of Arts (MA) at Cyprus International University (CIU) as one of the top students.



Throughout my master's studies, I gained many experiences by interacting with multicultural people. The skills and language proficiency I developed during my Access Foundation Programme and bachelor's degree at UKH were instrumental in making my higher education journey easier. However, consistency and discipline were always my motivations for tackling upcoming tasks. During my master's degree, I focused on developing various skills in my area of study, including evaluating potential political systems, understanding international relations theories, exploring contemporary politics in the Middle East, selecting and implementing analytical skills, addressing challenges of new political order in the world, identifying and analyzing state relations and their problems, examining critical international relations theories, and delving into issues in European Union integrations and policies.

After completing both my bachelor's and master's degrees, I chose the academic path. I successfully completed a pedagogical training course at Lebanese French University (LFU) as required by the Ministry of Higher Education and Scientific Research.

The competencies I gained from UKH have made me a highly motivated and responsible individual, skilled in communicating with impact and respect. I am reliable, trustworthy, rigorous, flexible, creative, and an innovative strategic thinker. My excellent organisational skills, attention to detail, and ability to prioritize tasks are complemented by strong analytical skills and knowledge of advanced statistical analysis and surveys. Senior Programme Assistant - UNHCR

After graduating in 2013, I had planned to immediately start my master's studies, but fate led me to engage directly in humanitarian work thereafter. Strangely enough, just several months later, a major humanitarian crisis occurred in June 2014. In August, I witnessed the heartbreaking exodus from my hometown of Sinjar and the subsequent humanitarian disasters. I found myself neglecting my dream of pursuing a master's degree as events unfolded rapidly, particularly with the intensifying battles against the terrorist organisation ISIS. This dream was replaced by a job that required an urgent response to humanitarian needs, especially with the onset of liberation operations.

Things dramatically changed; instead of engaging in master's classes, I provided training to numerous frontline workers in humanitarian response, focusing on providing urgent psychological support and protection for the most vulnerable groups. Instead of holding research supervisor meetings, I contributed to training dozens of youths to work in the humanitarian field. I then took on urgent tasks supervising the first healthcare project in northern Sinjar after its liberation by Peshmerga forces, where we established the first comprehensive hospital for returnees, marking a pivotal moment.

After that, my greatest opportunity came when I started working with the United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees (UNH-CR) as a senior programme assistant.

Did I truly forget my dream? Absolutely not. Despite all the pressures and difficulties, it remained a constant obsession, and it did come true, albeit with a set of challenges. Foremost among them was the conflict between my full-time job and my master's studies. You can imagine the shape of my day: it started with long work hours, extensive commitments, continuous meetings, field visits, and extensive discussions with governmental and local partners on optimal programme management.

The University of Kurdistan Hewlêr provided me with a unique opportunity, as it did for all my colleagues who were in the middle of their professional careers. Most of them were working in significant institutions and would not have been able to achieve what they did in their master's theses and maintain their professional progress without UKH.

I still believe it wasn't just a coincidence that I engaged in humanitarian work before starting my master's thesis. I presented my thesis titled "The Role of the United Nations High Commissioner

for Refugees in Protecting Refugees in Iraq," which was the first scholarly contribution on this topic at the regional and Iraqi levels.

Thus, I earned a master's degree in International Law and Diplomacy, which will enhance my research capabilities, reinforced by fieldwork to find appropriate solutions to the escalating humanitarian crises in the region. This experience provided me with a new perspective to understand the broader future needs of Kurdistan and the overall region.
